JOUR 4712 - Mass Media and Cultures 3 Credit Hours

Course Description:

This course orients future professional communicators to the challenges and opportunities involved in understanding and communicating with people of different cultures, both domestically and internationally. For the professional journalist, public relations practitioner, and advertising executive, such communication is crucial, as the world becomes more of a global village every day. Even if one never leaves the United States, he or she will find it necessary and inevitable to communicate with members of different cultural, racial and ethnic backgrounds in their professional world. Each culture communicates differently. Some of the differences are minor and subtle; others are major (both subtle and obvious).

Course Outcomes:

The goals of this course are to:

- 1. Learn how differences in cultures affect differences in communication;
- 2. Understand how to report effectively on different cultures;
- 3. Understand the patterns of worldwide news and information flow;
- 4. Understand how to practice professional communication with different countries.

Prerequisites and Corequisites:

Junior standing. This is a writing-intensive course and presupposes some familiarity with the journalism profession.

Assignments and Projects:

This course will involve weekly analysis papers. Most of the assignments will require students to rent (or buy, if you wish) feature films as designated below and in the modules, and to analyze them. The course will also require students to contribute to the class discussion page each week, and to do any other assignments as noted in the course modules. Each weekly assignment is worth 20 points.

- 1. The requirements are weekly papers of 1,200 words each, covering the assignments asked. Most of these assignments involve reading the assigned material and relating it to films as assigned. Each week several films are presented for you to choose from, and you may access them in any way you wish. Many students use Netflix, some use local libraries, some download them, and others find them on PPV channels. Occasionally, you can even find them on YouTube.
- 2. Class Discussion. Each student is required to participate in class discussion via registering responses to discussion questions found each week on the discussions page of this site.

All assignments are due by 11 p.m. central time on their due dates as noted in the Calendar pages and in the Assignments page.
